

Windows Product Key, what is it for and how is it used? (ChatGPT AI response)

Where is the product key?

- **Retail copy:** The key is printed on a card or included in the confirmation email if purchased online.

2. Type the command `(Get-WmiObject -query 'select * from SoftwareLicensingService').OA3xOriginalProductKey` and press Enter.
3. Your product key will be displayed.

Using Registry Editor

1. Type regedit in the Windows search bar and open the Registry Editor.
2. Navigate to `Computer\HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Microsoft\Windows NT\CurrentVersion\SoftwareProtectionPlatform`.
3. Look for the `BackupProductKeyDefault` key, which contains your product key ^{1 2}.

Other Options

- Check your email or Microsoft account for digital license confirmation emails.
- Look for a sticker on your device with the product key.
